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This report summarises the business that I have concluded on behalf of the CCG during June

As part of my local work I continue to chair the City Wide Locality Group where discussions took place around phlebotomy and city wide record sharing.

I chaired the June meeting of the Health and Wellbeing Board where the Board received an update on the Sustainability and Transformational Plan (STP) for South Yorkshire and Bassetlaw and how this relates to our Sheffield place-based approach and how we intend to assure ourselves of delivery. I also chaired a meeting of the Clinical Chairs and Accountable Officers from across South Yorkshire and Bassetlaw.

At the time of writing, a Protected Learning Event is planned for 28 June and the main topic for discussion will be Primary Care.

Work continues at pace around the Sustainability and Transformation Planning for Maternity and Children's Services across South Yorkshire. The appraisal on Children's Surgery is now being discussed through governing bodies (paper G of the 7 July Governing Body agenda) with a view to us moving forward to make changes soon. I continue to be involved and support these important discussions, as we look to develop a more sustainable position for the healthcare of children in the future.

As work continues on the Sustainability and Transformation Plan, I and the Accountable Officer were nominated to lead the Primary Care workstream and a group of lead clinicians from across South Yorkshire and Bassetlaw met to discuss what the STP will mean for Primary Care.

I, along with the Accountable Officer and the Director for Integrated Commissioning, attended the NHS Confederation Conference in Manchester. This was a busy event with a lot of high profile speakers including the Secretary of State, Jeremy Hunt, NHS England Chief Executive Simon Stevens and NHS Improvement's Chief Executive, Jim MacKay. NHS Clinical Commissioners had a very strong presence at the event.

Jeremy Hunt used his keynote firstly to celebrate achievements of the NHS, saying that he hoped that this would be seen as the NHS' 'decade of quality.' He spoke about a number of issues including mental health, A&E waiting times, NHS workplace culture and the importance of data for the NHS.. During his keynote, Simon Stevens covered a number of areas including STPs and finances, indicating that if any additional funding is to be found, social care should be the beneficiary. He also announced the launch of a new technology tariff to support the spread of innovation across the system. , Jim Mackey spoke about the challenges and opportunities of STPs, as well as the work that NHS Improvement and CQC are carrying out to create an aligned single view of quality.

NHS Sheffield CCG hosted a meeting of the Core Cities Networks and discussed New Care Models, Integrated Commissioning and the Better Care Fund, and Driving Growth Locally.
