The Macmillan Survivorship Partnership

South Yorkshire, Bassetlaw and North Derbyshire

The Macmillan Survivorship Partnership in South Yorkshire, Bassetlaw and North Derbyshire is working to ensure that people living with and beyond cancer feel well supported and able to lead the lives they choose. The programme is supported by seven Clinical Commissioning Groups (CCGs) and Macmillan Cancer Support.

There are over 20 projects across the region that will test different approaches to cancer survivorship. It is expected that the survivorship programme has the potential to reach 100,000 people affected by cancer in the region through health and social care initiatives.

The Macmillan Survivorship Partnership, led by Programme Manager Hayley Williams, will draw together the findings from the regional projects to develop a service specification for commissioners to include:

- Utilising existing services
- Embedding cancer survivorship services in primary care

- An understanding of where duplication exists through gap analysis
- Identification of new job roles
- The issues highlighted for patients through the Routes from Diagnosis analysis
- Alternative models for managing complex patients who have regular emergency admissions

A telephone support service provides motivational health and wellbeing support to colorectal, breast and prostate cancer patients. The project aims to improve health outcomes and productivity by providing telehealth support that is tailored to the individual. The service is run by dedicated nurses, who also support self management by providing patients with tools that enable them to monitor their own condition at home.

Bassetlaw

The Aurora WellBEing Centre in Worksop works with the NHS and voluntary sector to provide local people affected by cancer with individualised services that are meaningful to them. The centre is open to everyone affected by cancer, as well as the general public, its central location offers access to social activities, wellbeing services, therapeutic activities, gym membership and a cancer survivorship information team.

Doncaster

People living with and beyond cancer are able to access a full range of resources and services that support their needs from the point of diagnosis onwards.

Local people affected by cancer are driving the development of survivorship services in Doncaster following a co-production approach. The 'Living Well' service is now operating which gives local people affected by cancer access to over 80 care and support services that may be available to them.

This can include welfare and benefits advice, information on social groups or emotional support. The services include Cancer Buddies, a befriending scheme for cancer survivors and Meeting New Horizons, a third sector organisation with links to a range of community services for cancer survivors. Meeting New Horizons support community organisations by building on local social capital.

Hardwick

In North East Derbyshire (Hardwick) the cancer survivorship project aims to transfer follow-up appointments from secondary care to primary care.

A cancer survivorship support scheme is being considered which reflects the rural geography of Hardwick. North Derbyshire Voluntary Action and the Patient Participation Groups are keen to support the creation of a buddy scheme where people affected by cancer can be referred from point of diagnosis onwards and matched to someone who has been through the same experience to access support.

North Derbyshire

In High Peak, North Derbyshire, people affected by cancer are able to access the Blythe House Macmillan Information and Support Centre (MISC) for advice, information and support. The service is run by a team of nursing staff and trained volunteers providing drop in, appointments and telephone consultations. The service provides outreach events for difficult to access communities.

Rotherham

Rotherham's Macmillan Dynamic Case Management service is piloting a Macmillan Cancer Liaison service for urology cancer patients. The service aims to provide continuity of care for people living with and beyond a cancer diagnosis. A Macmillan Cancer Liaison Nurse spends dedicated time with the patient and family from point of diagnosis and has access to a full directory of local support services.

The Macmillan Cancer Liaison Nurse works closely with the patient to develop a personalised care plan, encouraging self management whenever possible.

Sheffield

There are a number of survivorship projects taking place across Sheffield, the main aim of the projects is to address cancer patient's disparate access to local care and support services. The projects focus on redesigning cancer pathways and, if appropriate, encouraging patients to self manage.

Sheffield has built a strong framework of support through the development of a comprehensive recovery package resulting from the development of risk stratified pathways for colorectal and breast cancer patients.

Elements of the Sheffield recovery package include:

- Holistic needs assessment
- Treatment summaries
- Patient Education and Support including health and wellbeing programmes
- Cancer Care Review

The other projects that are taking place in Sheffield include:

- Remote monitoring
- Workforce education and development
- Vocational Rehabilitation (Levels 1 & 2) Sheffield Occupational Health Advisory Service
- CALM project
- Macmillan Active Everyday physical activity pilot
- Macmillan Complex Case Managers based at Sheffield Teaching Hospitals
- Macmillan Age UK Independent Living Coordinators support older people to live independently
